



Year 1 Visit The Historic Dockyard in Old Portsmouth







# The Year 4 Trip: Fishbourne Roman Palace

On Friday 6th May, Year 4 went on a lovely trip.

Firstly, Year 4 went on a coach and sat for about an hour before getting to the car park where the coach parked there. The people that went on the trip were Mrs. Bailey, Mr. Halliday, Ms. McGrath, Mr. Ace and of course, Year 4. They then had a little biscuit break before going into the museum for a 15 minute film, introducing how the palace was found and what happened to it. The palace was burnt down in 270 AD, more than 100 years after it was built. Later in the 1960s they dug the place up and found some beautiful mosaics. The most completed mosaic was The Dolphin mosaic.

The two year 4 classes decided two split up after that: 4M outside exploring the gardens and 4H inside observing the mosaics, tiles from the roof and a skeleton!



They got booklets for activities and observation. Whichever pair completed the most activities, would win the prize: a Roman gods ruler. 4M were stunned by the gardens, it was so neat and colourful!





There was also a hypocaust next to the gardens, this was a really clever underground heating system which could have caused the disaster of the fire. Even more, today's underground heating system was based on the Roman.

Then, there were mosaics (for 4M- 4H were in the gardens). There were lots of mosaics, but a few other things as well: a skeleton, tiles from the roof and some footprints! There were boards to show information about the architecture.

Next, was lunch on a tiny hill. People rolled down the hill after some sandwiches and the Year 4s got Mr Ace to roll down too!

Workshops were after lunch. The two classes would go to different workshops for the first half and swap for the second half. This picture is 4H in the Roman kitchens and activities like the spindles. In



that activity, one person would be dressed as a prince and someone else a princess. Another activity was candle making an experimentation about different materials. Some of the materials were really stinky! Overall, Year 4 had a

#### Japan prepares to open for tourism the first time since 2020:

Japan will start to conduct what is known as 'test tourism' in small batches of people in late May. Soon after that, officials state tourism will receive a full opening to the world's public. # **SCIENCE: Vaccines**

Vaccines are among one of the greatest inventions in medical history. They have saved many lives and have greatly improved the way that we lived. In this article I will talk to you about how a vaccine works, and how & why vaccines were invented, in detail.

### What is a vaccine?

Scientifically, a vaccine is a biological type of preparation with the purpose of providing active immunity against an (infectious & harmful) disease. Normally, A vaccine will include an agent that appears as the cause of a certain disease (which will be microorganisms or viruses in this typical case). They are often grown in labs, and sometimes from real samples of infectants. The reason for this is that our immune system contains a special type of cell known as the memory T-cells. Their job is to remember the disease that had previously infected, and to notify the white blood cells what type of antibody they should produce if that disease infects again. Thus when vaccines (basically the weakened version of the real disease) are first injected into our bodies, our immune

system responds to this by easily taking the disease out, while in the process the memory T-cells automatically remembers what type of antibody is needed. This makes it so that you are practically immune to that disease without suffering any painful symptoms, or potentially, death.

# How were vaccines invented?

Vaccines were first invented 1796 by a county doctor named **Edward Jenner**. On one ordinary day, he discovered that milk maids rarely contracted **smallpox**, one of the deadliest diseases to have ever roamed on planet earth. He also found out that they all have contracted a disease known as **cowpox**, which is a lot less deadly and

rarely does any physical damage on the human body. So, he decided to test his theory by injecting cowpox first into a boy's body, followed by smallpox. Reasonably enough, the boy stayed in a fine condition. The world's first vaccination had therefore been performed. Now, in the age of COVID-19, vaccines have been utilized into many different forms. They are designed to be much more effective in different stages of an infection by a disease, or just simply, according to the infectant's physical condition. However, we must always remember that it all started with an ordinary county doctor's idea.

When a substance is heated up, its particles move more and increases in volume– this is known as thermal expansion. Contrarily, a drop in temperature causes it to contract again.




**5:** A flea can accelerate faster than a **space shuttle:** A jumping flea reaches heights of about 8 cm in a milli-second.


## **PREMIER LEAGUE**


# <u>'Why Didn't They</u> Ask Evans?'






